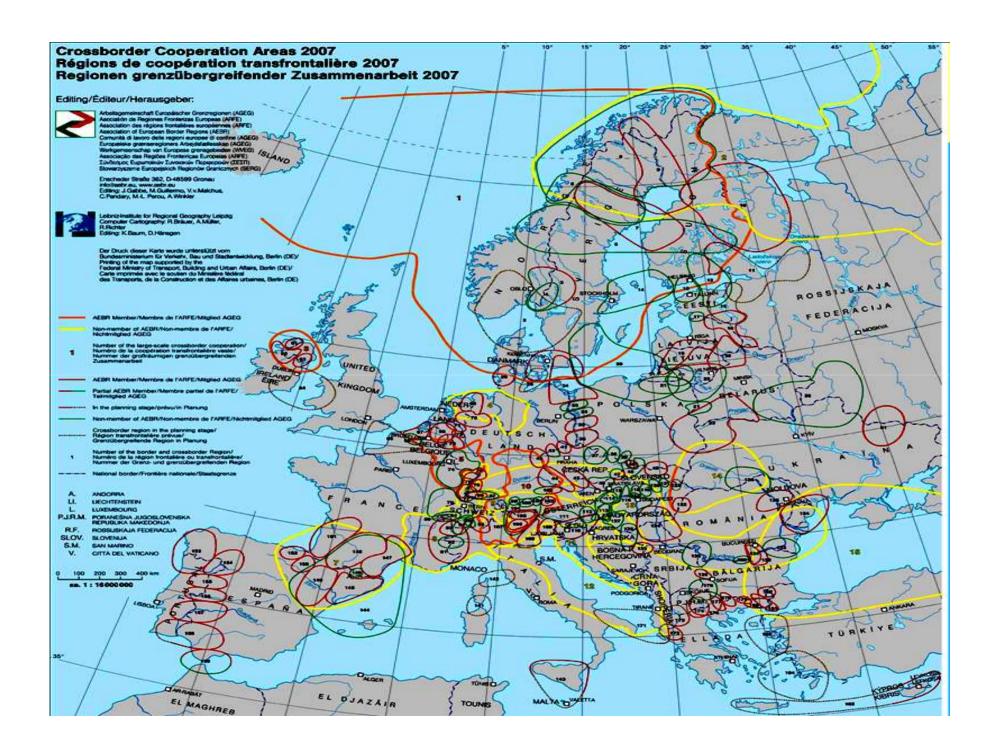

CBC Added Value



- (Pan-) European (Continental)
- Political
- Institutional
- Socio-economic
- Socio-cultural



Specific added value to implement Lisbon Strategy (Mistake: too restricted)



- Additionallity of cross-border programmes and projects
- Synergy through CBC
- Joint Research and Innovation
- CB Networking
- Benchmarking (exchange of best practice and know-how)
- Spin-off effects by overcoming borders
- Efficient CB resource management

The EGTC regulation

Regulation of the European Parliament and of the Council establishing a European Grouping of Territorial Cooperation (EGTC)

EGTC – what is it?

- A new legal instrument on EU level with legal personality
- A binding Regulation, not a Directive
- Why is such an instrument needed?
- The existing legal framework:
 - does not exist in many countries
 - is not sufficient
 - and is not efficient
- An EU response is required in such a situation: national responses are frequently inadequate and not coordinated

EGTC – new optional instrument

- The Regulation entered into force on 1/8/2006 and applied from 1/8/2007
- Member States <u>free</u> to delegate management of a Territorial Co-operation <u>programme</u> to an EGTC
- Regional/local partners <u>free</u> to run co-operation <u>projects</u> as an EGTC
- Potential to develop EGTCs as political tool for regional development

EGTC – How to set up an EGTC? (1)

- Who can be a member?
- a) Member States (especially those without regions)
- b) Regional authorities
- c) Local authorities
- d) Bodies governed by public law (as defined by the public procurement directive)
- + Associations consisting of such bodies
- Bodies from at least two Member States
- (Participation from third countries is possible, but only if the third country adopts identical legislation into its national law or if covered by international agreements)

EGTC – How to set up an EGTC? (2)

- Draft Convention and Statutes to be drafted
- Ex-ante agreement of Member States:
- Member States must respond within 3 months + explain reasons if EGTC is rejected
- Procedure according to national rules, which Member States must prepare or designate
- After Member State approval EGTC Members agree unanimously final Convention and Statutes

EGTC – How to set up an EGTC? (3)

- Statutes shall be registered/published in the Member State of "registered office"
- Legal personality from day of national registration/publication
- « Registered office » determines applicable law
- "Most extensive legal capacity" in relation to property, employ staff, legal proceedings, etc.
- Members inform Member States concerned + Committee of Regions about the creation of the EGTC
- Within 10 days send request to publish notice in Official Journal with key information

EGTC – How to set up an EGTC? (4)

- Content of <u>Convention</u>:
- basic elements such as name, registered office, territory, list of members, objective and tasks, duration and dissolution
- Content of Statutes:
- ALL provisions of convention and
- operating provisions such as organs, decision-making procedures, working language(s), recruitment and personnel contracts, financial contributions and other financial issues, member's liability

EGTC exists and acts (1)

- What can an EGTC do?
- Carry out TASKS given by its members
- Act within the confines of tasks given
- Limited to co-operation in cohesion field
- What can EGTC NOT do?
- Exercise of powers conferred by public law to safeguard general interest of State: e.g. Police, Regulatory powers, Justice, Foreign policy

[However, eligibility under ERDF-Regulation!]

EGTC exists and acts (2)

- What can an EGTC also do?
 It is limited primarily to 1. + 2.
- Implement co-operation <u>programmes</u>
 (EGTC signs grant letters as managing authority)
- 2. Run co-operation <u>projects</u> (ERDF, ESF, CF) (EGTC is the lead or another beneficiary)

But, an EGTC may carry out...

- 3. other specific co-operation actions with EU funding or
- 4. other co-operation actions without EU funding
 - projects such as Cerdagne Hospital, or
 - potentially more "political" EGTCs and larger regional groupings such as Euregios)

EGTC manages public funds and is liable

- Assembly approves <u>annual budget</u> of the EGTC, covering running costs and "operational component"
- EU funds managed and controlled according to relevant EU law
- 3. National funds controlled in a similar way than EU funds
- Liability of EGTC as such
- Residual liability of members
